

## What are countable & uncountable nouns?

Type of noun	What is it?	Examples
Countable (count noun)	<ul> <li>refers to people, places, things, and ideas that can be counted</li> <li>can be either singular nouns or plural nouns</li> <li>can use the articles a or an</li> <li>makes sense to precede countable nouns with a number</li> <li>more common</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>People: friend, strangers, children</li> <li>Places: island, neighborhoods, garages</li> <li>Things: hat, artichokes, trophies</li> </ul>
Uncountable (mass noun)	<ul> <li>refers to a thing that cannot be counted</li> <li>most cannot use the articles a or an</li> <li>can't be preceded by a number</li> <li>treated as singular nouns and don't typically have plural forms</li> <li>less common and are often harder to spot</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Emotions: confusion, loneliness, envy</li> <li>Qualities: laziness, dedication, patience</li> <li>Concepts: cooperation, obscurity, art</li> </ul>
