Demonstrative	used to express relative positions in space and time.	that these those	This weekend is going to be really fun.

Participial	based on participles, which are words that usually end in -ed or -ing and derive from verbs	amazing impressed fascinating	Travis was late for his <b>swimming</b> lessons.
Limiting	restricts a noun or pronoun rather than describe any of its characteristics or qualities	these your some	She found <b>three</b> pennies under the couch cushions.
Descriptive	describes the characteristics, traits, or qualities of a noun or pronoun	what which whose	A lot of <b>interesting</b> people visit this park.
Interrogative	used to ask questions	what which whose	Which button turns off the lights?
Attributive	placed directly next to the noun and pronoun that they modify	beautiful special	The <b>hungry</b> gorilla ate the <b>fresh</b> mangoes.
Distributive	refers to members of a group individually	every either neither	<b>Each</b> puppy got their own little doghouse.
